NEW TRAVEL GRANTS AVAILABLE

The new travel grant is an initiative that is meant to support faculty work and creative pedagogical activities while showcasing faculty excellence both locally and nationally. Funds can be used to support faculty travel to conferences where teaching, teaching scholarship, and curricular initiatives

will be the focus, including those aimed at discipline specific or general higher education audiences (e.g., CUR, AACU, PKAL, etc).

Priority will be given to faculty who will be reporting on their teaching and teaching scholarship at such conferences. However, faculty members who are chairs or organizers of conference sessions are also eligible for consideration, as are those who simply would like to attend such a conference.

JEN LEIGH INTRODUCES TEACHING PHILOSOPHY WORKSHOPS

Clarifying the Foundations of our Practice. A carefully written statement of why you do what you do when you teach can be extremely useful. But getting your teaching philosophy on paper can often be a daunting task. Last spring, Jen Leigh (SOM) shared an approach to getting a philosophy on paper at RIT's Faculty Institute of Technology and Learning (FITL). Her workshop there got rave reviews. This semester, Jen has agreed to lead three discussions/workshops here at Nazareth. The first of these, Explorations on the

Teaching Philosophy: Opening Pandora's Box, began on 13 October with an exercise designed to help participants discern between key educational philosophies while codifying a personalized set of teaching and learning principals. Twelve participants, with a mix of new and not quite so new faculty, discussed their underlying premises and assumptions about teaching while also commenting on new directions they could consider.

Subsequent follow-up discussions are scheduled for 27 October and 14

December (both 12:00 -1:00 p.m. in G351). Newcomers are welcome.

DC. A powerful take home message for the group was that the rudiments

of undergraduate research are very much present in nearly every department at Nazareth. According to CUR, undergraduate research exists when there is a clear product of an investigative activity in which the students do the work and students are clearly still being taught. CUR is broadening its focus to encourage

undergraduate research across the disciplines through a variety of mechanisms, including funding. Our group agreed that the next step in being able to participate fully in this emerging conversation would be to *create and disseminate a departmental and program catalogue* of what is presently being done. CTE will begin this work in the near future.

UPDATES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF THE CENTER FOR TEACHING EXCELLENCE

Thinking about planning an interdisciplinary group to exchange ideas and brainstorm about a shared problem/issue related to your work as professionals at Nazareth?

Since its inception in Fall 2002, CTE has sponsored and supported a variety of different types of groups whose purpose was to facilitate professional development and learning through small group discussion and dialogue. Some of the discussions were facilitated by me, but others (namely, many of the teaching circles) were not. The response to these various opportunities has generally been quite positive. But feedback from those who have participated also suggests that broadening these discussions (including the teaching circle discussions) to allow for a wider range of topics would afford richer faculty development opportunities for those who participate.

Case in point is the Social Justice Teaching Circle, an ongoing discussion of 5-8 faculty for the past seven years. This group has evolved into a Would a \$200 budget help foster your interdisciplinary discussions?

dedicated effort to address how to use social theory and social justice theory not just in the classroom, but also to inform cross-discipline work in support of the College's mission. Their ongoing readings and discussions have afforded the participants an unusual and valuable vehicle for a professional conversation related to social justice and social theory. Numerous overarching questions have framed their conversations. And the group recently notes that "their investigation into the influence of social and cultural theory on our teaching and scholarship has been transformative and has facilitated the creation of a learning community."

In response to feedback, the Center has broadened the previously implemented concept of a teaching circle to become simply a faculty learning group. Obviously, faculty learn from one another in many different ways. Learning groups exist in a variety of different forms, all of which have their

place within a college setting. To be eligible for support from the Center, these faculty learning groups must meet certain guidelines, including being interdisciplinary, having a clear set of goals and questions to use as a starting point, and consisting of five to twelve members.
