# G FALL- Reframing Disability: Dismounting Differences

#### **Organization: Capital Area Therapeutic Riding Association**

Location: Grantville, PA

#### Focus: Therapeutic Horseback Riding

#### Date: Wednesday Oct. 3rd - Sunday Oct. 7th 2018

How does riding horses bring hope for individuals with a wide range of abilities? # WINTER- A Cross Cultural Exchange: Empowering others through self Empowerment

#### Organization: ICADS Location: Costa Rica Focus: Poverty and Community Development Date: 1 week in January

We will be partnering with the Institute for Central American Development Studies (ICADS). Students will be immersed in Costa Rican Culture as they partner with a grassroots rural development cooperative whose mission is to empower local coffee and citrus farmers (among others) through education, environmental sustainability training, political advocacy, and by providing access to newer technologies. Students will work alongside families and experience firsthand the challenges and opportunities of the region.

## UNINTER- Giving a Hand After Harvey: Hurricane Relief

#### Organization: All Hearts and Hands Location: The Gulf Coast, Texas Focus: Disaster Relief & Recovery Date: January 7th-13th

Students will provide support and relief to areas recovering from Hurricane Harvey, as well as make meaningful comparisons between areas in the U.S. By partnering with this committed organization, students will see the effects of this extremely powerful hurricane and help rebuild buildings on the campus of The Rhodes School for the Performing Arts in Houston, which is a public charter school that heavily serves low-income students and was severely impacted by Hurricane Harvey.

# SPRING- Global Compassion: Helping Hands for Elderly Individuals

Organization: UBELONG Location: Quito, Ecuador Focus: Healthcare Date: Spring 2019

Every person matters and every person deserves a healthy and safe life. This intensive trip focuses on healthcare and partners with a global organization working with local communities in Ecuador. Students will provide helping hands, positive social interaction, and lead activities to improve the quality of life for elderly individuals who lack family support. Students will also be involved with rehabilitation sessions at a local public clinic. In addition, the differences and similarities in healthcare and poverty between the U.S. and Ecuador will be explored by students.

# SPRING- Building Hope with our Hands: Creating Sustainable Housing for Families in West Virginia

Organization: Appalachia Service Project Location: Brenton, WV Focus: Sustainable Housing Date: Spring Break

According to the US Census Bureau as of 2015, 43.1 million Americans were living in poverty - a condition where their basic needs for food, clothing, and shelter are not being met. This trip will explore the intersections of poverty, hunger and safe housing through service and learning opportunities. Students on this trip will be engaging in hands-on building and renovation projects through the non-profit, Appalachia Service Project. Daily, students will work alongside families living in rural poverty. Throughout the trip and the pre-trip experience, students will examine the importance of sustainable housing in rural and urban communities.
