The course load in the Berlin Residential Program at *Studienforum Berlin* is 5 courses. All residential students are expected to carry a full load (15cr. or 16 cr., depending on your home college requirements). **You must consult with your academic department and/or your academic advisor and obtain prior approval to take each of these courses. Each course should be formally accepted by your institution for you to receive maximum academic credit transfer.**

The academic program includes three established course components: three liberal arts courses; one internship course; one German language course. Use the **Course Selection/Advisement Form** (p.6) in this packet to obtain credit approval from your academic advisor or a department chair for credit allocation. On the form, designate the disciplines for credit for each of the three liberal arts courses you choose (out of 1 through 6). For the Internship course, rank your preferences (below). Course Details and Descriptions

Please use these course descriptions when petitioning for credit approval from department chairpersons. You should photocopy pages 3 and 4 and provide each chairperson and advisor with a copy for departmental records.

The **Liberal Studies** (humanities) courses in Nazareth College's Berlin Residential Program are taught in English by professors holding the Ph.D. in at least one of the disciplines referenced for each cross-listed course. Courses may be taken for 3 or 4 semester credits, depending on a home institution's course credit arrangement. (For the fourth credit a student must write an additional critical term paper in consultation with the professor.) Nazareth College is the sole administrator of U.S. based college-university credit for the Berlin Residential Program. For the purpose of comparison, reference may be made to the Nazareth College departmental webpage (<http://www.naz.edu>) or to the Studienforum Berlin program (<http://www.studienforum-berlin.de>).

Language courses in German meet as regular courses and students' abilities will be assessed for proper placement. **Internships** will be monitored, mentored and assessed according to the Nazareth College guidelines for credit bearing internships (<http://www.naz.edu/dept/cie/intern.cfm>). Syllabi are available upon request.

German Language (Elementary, Intermediate or Advanced): 5 credits

All students take a German Language course

DIE NEUE SCHULE, an international language school in Berlin, facilitates language study for our residential program. DIE NEUE SCHULE offers language courses with other international students at all levels. The course curricula follow European Union guidelines for language acquisition. All instructors are specially trained in German language acquisition and pedagogy. Students with no prior German language experience enroll in the A1 level. All levels emphasize active listening, speaking, and reading/spelling abilities. Intermediate and advanced levels help prepare students acquire all the skills required for independent interaction in society, or to pass the German university entrance exams. *The course is conducted intensively during the first two months of the semester.*

Professional Internship, 3 credits

*All students take part in an Internship**

Credit bearing, professional internships are available in a discipline appropriate to students' skills, major areas of study and relative ability in English and/or German. Students complete an internship, conducted full time and lasting four weeks, at the end of the semester. All internships follow guidelines for academic internships taken through Nazareth College, at home or abroad. By the time of the internship, all students will have at least a basic working knowledge of German. Students with less knowledge of the language will be placed in environments where good English language skills (communicating and writing) are required. Good computer skills are a definite advantage. Students with facility in the language have a broader range of options. Suitable academic preparation is required in some cases. Internship areas may include: business; government; political and cultural institutions; chemical labs; museums; theaters; education; international organizations; etc. All students must present an up-to-date résumé. Internship sites are assigned in consultation with the student and advisement from the student's home campus. Internships for US citizens are unpaid, by law. **There exists the option to substitute the internship with an independent research project with a special mentor.*

Students choose three courses from among the six listed below.

Course Title: European Economics and Business Administration, 3 credits

This course explores: patterns of the European (EU) integration process and the related national economies; analysis of the institutional transformation of Western Europe from a collection of fractious nation-states to a partially amalgamated European Union; the impact of “widening” and “deepening” of the European Union on the business environment. This course also analyzes: European monetary and financial structures; capital and labor movements; migration. Prospects of the EU’s continued integration process and its implications for international business relations also considered. We also arrange visits to Berlin venues with political-economic significance.

Course Title: 20th Century German Theater, Literature, Cabaret 3 credits

This course includes readings and discussion of dramas, prose, poetry and song from the Weimar Republic to the present, including works by Brecht, Döblin, Tucholsky, Kästner, Peter Schneider, Christa Wolf and others. Artistic works will be discussed as a reflection of creative and aesthetic forms, as well as social milieu, ideologies, moral and philosophical questions. We engage in the analysis of theater in Berlin (Max Reinhardt, Gustaf Gründgens, epic theater, post-war theater in divided Berlin). Attendance at theaters, especially those staging B. Brecht’s works is crucial. We will also engage in the study of selected films from the Weimar Republic to the present, and take field trips to film museums and cultural sites in Berlin – Babelsberg – Potsdam that relate to literature and theater. Finally, we will conduct some study of cabaret life (art, song and dance).

Course Title: German History 1870 to the Present 3 credits

This course conducts an analysis of turning points of German history in the European context, beginning with the first German unification 1871 and the Bismarck era or Wilhelmine Empire. We will explore empire growth and colonialism, the causes of World War I, and the troubled liberal democracy of the Weimar Republic until 1933. Special attention paid to Nazism, Anti-Semitism, the Holocaust and World War II during the Hitler period (1933 to 1945). Also considered are Germany’s place in the post-WWII Cold War, with a divided Germany, 1949 to 1989, and unification in 1990, as well as current developments in the emerging European Union. Attention will be paid to the historical backgrounds of current German developments. Course visits to museums and major historical sites in and around Berlin included.

Course Title: Symphonic Music and Opera: Mozart to Mahler 3 credits

This course includes a thorough survey of two major idioms in music during the Classic, Romantic and part of the post-Romantic eras, tracing the rapid development and maturity of these two genera, beginning with Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven, and the evolution of symphony music in the works of Schubert, Schumann, Mendelssohn and Brahms, as music expression expands. We explore the development of Program Music as represented by Liszt et al. Finally, we look at the expansion of music with its more developed emotional power in the works of Bruckner and Mahler. In parallel with symphonic music, the course investigates the development of opera from the magnificent and provocative operas of Mozart through to the romantic-nationalistic style of Weber and the music-drama style of Wagner. Course work includes listening assignments and attendance at concerts and recitals in Berlin.

Course Title: Conflict and Peace Studies 3 credits

This course explores the development of the concepts of war and peace within the framework of the Social Sciences. Especially since 9/11, and now within the context of more current conflicts and international interventions, the ensuing debate engages an even wider public and affects the discourse about old and new forms of conflict. The course will look at the causes and consequences of conflict as well as appropriate strategies to end them. The theoretical- historical approach will make use of case studies from past and ongoing violent conflicts (Europe, Middle East, etc.), to focus on common and divergent lines of development and the potential reasons for persistence or termination of conflict. Field trips will take students to relevant political sites and research centers in Berlin.

Course Title: Sustainability – European Approaches 3 credits

Germany is a major player in the sustainability initiatives within the European Union. This course investigates those successful actions that can be applied world wide, particularly in terms of energy conservation and waste recycling, to confront global warming and general environmental degradation. Topics will include Germany’s National Sustainability Strategy, the role of the Green Party in shaping government policy and the role of other stakeholders in decision-making, to maximize the acceptance of sustainable practices by the world’s populations. The course will also address the various measures used to develop sustainability actions and monitor their success. Field trips are included to environmental and governmental centers and to scientifically relevant sustainability sites such as a windmill farm or a net-zero energy village.
