

Overview of Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) for Academic Programs

Why do we have a system in place for assessing SLOs?

Briefly, the expectations of the Middle States Commission on Higher Education require that we demonstrate the following:

- Clearly articulated SLOs for all programs at all levels
- A documented, organized and sustained assessment process to evaluate and improve student learning
- Assessment results that provide evidence that students are achieving SLOs
- Evidence that student learning assessment is shared with constituents and used to improve teaching and learning
- Documented use of student learning assessment information as part of institutional assessment

At what levels are SLOs assessed?

SLOs are assessed at three levels—the institution, the academic program and the course:

Institution	<p>Students who graduate from Nazareth College will:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Have demonstrated a broad and deep understanding of themselves and the world through the multiple perspectives of the liberal arts and sciences (UG) 2. Have demonstrated critical thinking and knowledge pertinent to their respective degree program and the demands of their discipline 3. Be prepared to engage as informed members of the local and global community <p>These SLOs are assessed based on outcomes of student learning assessment at the program level.</p>
Program	<p>SLOs at this level are both more specific than, and aligned to, institutional SLOs.</p> <p>Each program develops its own SLOs.</p> <p>Program SLOs are made available publicly on the Academic Assessment website and should be updated and revised as necessary for continuous improvement of program.</p> <p>These SLOs are assessed by program faculty each year with the purpose of using assessment data to inform curricular decisions and improve program quality.</p>
Course	<p>SLOs at this level are the most specific and are aligned to program SLOs.</p> <p>These SLOs are typically assessed by individual course instructors.</p> <p>Outcomes of student learning in courses are often the data used in program assessment.</p>

What is a Curriculum Map?

A curriculum map is a matrix that displays the relationship between a program's SLOs and the courses in that program. This document allows a program to articulate how/whether each course is addressing or assessing each SLO. It is important that each program maintains a curriculum map so that learning outcomes are clearly linked from the course to the program level. A curriculum map is to be submitted (or updated) each October along with assessment results. What are program directors responsible for reporting each year?

Student Learning Outcomes	<i>Clear statements of expected knowledge, skills, attitudes, competencies that students are expected to acquire</i>
Evidence	<i>Specific data source intended to indicate students' progress toward an SLO</i>
Criteria	<i>What they will look to have achieved in order to know whether the SLO has been met</i>
Findings	<i>Analysis of evidence</i>
Actions	<i>Next steps for improvement of outcomes based on findings; closing-the-loop by articulating what actions have been taken based on previous years' assessment findings</i>

Who is responsible for the oversight of SLO assessment on campus?

Deans	Provide oversight of program assessment in their schools and ensure that their faculty are attending appropriately to assessment processes and procedures
Department Chairs	Provide oversight of program assessment in their departments; encourage faculty participation in assessment events and reinforce assessment timelines
Program Directors	Responsible for articulating program SLOs, collecting and analyzing assessment data, and in collaboration with program faculty, using findings to inform curricular and pedagogical improvements each year; responsible for submitting assessment results to data management Specialist by October 1 st each year
Academic Assessment Committee	Elected by the faculty and charged with reviewing assessment plans, policies and procedures; review, develop, recommend and monitor institutional assessment procedures
Coordinator of SLO Assessment	Facilitator between the Academic Assessment Committee and college administration; supports assessment on campus with professional development opportunities; analyzes assessment data in Academic Affairs
Data Management Specialist	Oversees assessment reporting mechanisms and supports faculty in their use of reporting tools

How do program directors submit their assessment results to the college each year?

Will all programs be reviewed by the Academic Assessment Committee each year?

The Academic Assessment Committee reviews programs' assessment plans on a 2-year cycle. That is, each program will be reviewed and, therefore, will receive feedback from the Academic Assessment Committee every other year. If a program director or dean would like to, they may request that the Academic Assessment Committee review a particular program, even if that program is not scheduled to be in the sample for that year.

What are the assessment events that take place throughout the year?

While this calendar represents important events and deadlines, it is not exhaustive. Please stay tuned for additional events.

September	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessment Day – Workshop and/or Individual Consultations provided by SLO Coordinator • Programs should update and revise their SLOs and evidence in preparation for data collection in the current academic year
October	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessment report deadline for previous year's assessment data – October 1st • Academic Assessment Committee begins reviewing assessment reports
November	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Academic Assessment Committee continues and concludes reviews of assessment reports
December	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All feedback returned to program directors for programs in Academic Assessment Committee's sample
January	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessment Day – Workshop and/or Individual Consultations provided by SLO Coordinator
February - April	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Program assessment work to focus on using assessment data for program improvement and articulating SLOs for the following year
May	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Assessment Day – Workshop and/or Individual Consultations provided by SLO Coordinator • Program director/assessment liaisons receive notification that they are/are not in the following year's sample for review by Academic Assessment Committee
